Examination of the history of Latinas in the US with a focus on women, gender, and sexuality. Students will consider how historians use oral histories, life histories, memoirs, biographies, and testimonials as sources to restore Latinas to histories from which they were previously omitted. LLAS 3998-001 -Human Rights on the US/Mexican Border

Instructor: Anne Gebelein In Person Tu/Th 12:30PM – 1:45PM

Narratives of im/migrant, civil and human rights told by people of Mexican and Central American origin. Stories, film, and autobiographies are considered in juxtaposition with documentation about human rights concerns in the U.S. and Mexico. Border-crossing, asylum, detention, slavery, children's rights, femicide, and the border wall are prominent themes.

LLAS 3998-005 - Puerto Rico and Colonial Scientific Knowledge

Instructor: Bethsaida Nieves In Person M/W 4:40PM – 5:55PM

This course examines the construction of race, race thinking, and racial purity in national and colonial formations of education and governance in Puerto Rico and the United States. Consideration of eugenics, biopolitics, biopower, and governmentality; transcultural and diasporic experiences; cultural, legal, scientific, and educational constructions of difference.
