LLAS 3998-001 – Women's Health in Latine & Afro-American Communities

Health care issues and disparities experienced by women in Latine and Afro American communities. Course will include clinical and social understandings of health issues, a brief primer in anatomy and physiology, and discussions of how to advance health outcomes for all women. The course will include historical and contemporary perspectives. No prerequisites.

Cuban filmmaker Santiago Alvarez described his cinematic style as the style of hating imperialism. This course engages a longstanding Latin American tradition of contesting and resisting the history of U.S. imperialism in the region. This course (taught in Spanish) examines works of essay, documentary, memoir, fiction, poetry, visual art, and music positioned against U.S. imperialism, primarily by Latin American artists, intellectuals, and political activists from the late nineteenth-century to the present.

LLAS 3998-003 – Human Rights on the US/Mexican Border

Combined Course: HRTS 3298

Narratives of im/migrant, civil and human rights told by people of Mexican and Central American origin. Stories, film, and autobiographies are considered in juxtaposition with documentation about human rights concerns in the U.S. and Mexico. Border-crossing, asylum, detention, slavery, children's rights, femicide, and the border wall are prominent themes.

LLAS 3998-004 – International Perspectives on Civilian Law

Combined Course: POLS 2998

Students will explore the civilian legal system of Latin America besides that of Continental Europe. They will view it from the perspective of the United States model. The course will foreground several fields: constitutional, civil, procedural, and commercial law. It will analyze them with a focus on human rights.
